You are already trimmed because of the word I have spoken to you.

Remain in me, and I will remain in you.

A branch can't produce fruit by itself, but must remain in the vine.

Likewise, you can't produce fruit unless you remain in me.

I am the vine; you are the branches.

If you remain in me and I in you, then you will produce much fruit."

Dear friends, let's love each other, because love is from God,

and everyone who loves is born from God and knows God.

This is how the love of God is revealed to us:

God has sent his only Son into the world so that we can live through him.

This is love: it is not that we loved God but that God loved us

and sent the Son as the redeeming sacrifice for our sins.

Dear friends, if God loved us this way, we also ought to love each other.

No one has ever seen God.

If we love each other, God remains in us and God's love is made perfect in us.

There is no fear in love, but perfect love drives out fear, because fear expects punishment.

The person who is afraid has not been made perfect in love.

We love because God first loved us.

Those who say, "I love God" and hate their brothers or sisters are liars.

After all, those who don't love their brothers or sisters whom they have seen

can hardly love God whom they have not seen!

This is the commandment we have received:

Those who claim to love God ought to love their brother and sister also.
